“*La Compañía de Terrenos y Aguas de la Baja California, S. A.: An Environmental Enterprise Shaping the Lower Colorado River Region, 1900-1962*” analyzes the history of an American-owned transnational water distributing company operating under a contract with Mexico to divert water from the Colorado River to desert farmers on both sides of the California-Baja California border in a basin known as the Imperial-Mexicali Valley. This project will result in the first comprehensive history of the lower Colorado River region from Yuma, Arizona to the Gulf of California (Sea of Cortez). Dependant on supplies, labor, and machinery transported by rail and steamboat from Yuma, AZ, *La Compañía’s* operations included dams, miles of levees, and an extensive aqueduct system in Mexico. This groundbreaking study explores how *La Compañía’s* water system propelled the growth of one of the most productive agricultural districts in the U.S. and Mexico, as well as guaranteed California and Mexico legal entitlement to a significant portion of the Colorado River. Moreover, *La Compañía’s* activities reveal how the U.S. and Mexico regulated and fought over the Colorado River, trade, migration, and labor relations along this stretch of the international border.
