In Fall 2017, I taught a graduate research methods course COMM 6011: Visual Ethnography. I (along with Professor Bethany Johnson (History)) mentored students on how to conduct an ethnographic group project (e.g., contact participants, conduct interviews (students interviewed and video recorded 16 individuals (Reproductive and Endocrinology and Infertility patients, doctors, nurses and fertility allies), informed consent processes, transcribe and analyze data (storyboard), member checking, visually represent data and share with community. The draft of the film is 42 minutes.

Across 16 interviews, individuals discussed their positive and negative experiences with infertility and fertility treatments (e.g., social support, practitioner-patient communication). Practitioners discussed challenges and rewards of treating and supporting patients while patients discussed support desired versus received and other challenges they faced during treatment (obstacles with coordination of care and the healthcare system in general). Patients discussed ways to support individuals going through treatment (e.g., infertility-specific greeting cards), debunked longstanding myths about infertility and gave advice for those striving to become fertility allies (e.g., friends, family co-workers, acquaintances).

On December 15, 2017, a local news anchor, Allison Latos, who shared her infertility struggles, covered this documentary on the local news (WSOC-9). It re-aired on Saturday December 16, 2017.
